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NEWS FROM THE FACULTY

The Faculty Board last met on 11 October in conjunction with the very successful Spring Meeting in Newcastle.

RELATIONSHIPS

Liasons with Medical Colleges

AFRM (RACP)

Dr Kathy McCarthy, President of the AFRM (RACP) met with the Board in Newcastle to discuss opportunities for collaboration and sharing of resources. Faculty trainees will now have access to the AFRM Bi-National Training Program (BNTP) sessions of relevance to their training. There will be no site or individual fee for Faculty trainees attending BNTP sessions from a site where there is an AFRM trainee. A schedule and list of funded sites will soon be circulated to Faculty trainees.

The potential for a combined conference of the two organizations was discussed.

Dr McCarthy also reported on the success of the Australian Rehabilitation Outcomes Centre, a joint initiative of the Australian rehabilitation sector (providers, funders, regulators and consumers) established by the AFRM (RACP) in July 2002. The Faculty Research Committee is considering the development of a Pain Outcomes initiative.

APS/NZPS

Following a recommendation at a recent teleconference meeting with the APS and NZPS, the Faculty Board resolved that a combined meeting of the Faculty and the two societies be considered for 2017, then every 6-8 years thereafter. These dates were calculated not to compete with the IASP World Congress scheduled every 2 years.

CORPORATE AFFAIRS

New Zealand Application for Specialty Recognition

The New Zealand Office of ANZCA has now received the letter from Medical Council of New Zealand confirming its decision to invite the FPM to submit to Stage Two of their application process for recognition of Pain Medicine as a separate vocational specialty in New Zealand. For the Stage Two submission some 'additional' information will be required because of their

changed policy part way through our submission process. The additional information is especially regarding the sustainability of the FPM. It is expected Stage II will take at least 6 months.

Undergraduate Student Medical Prize

As part of its strategic plan to increase the level of education and training in pain medicine, the Board resolved to pilot an undergraduate medical student prize in ten medical schools across Australia and New Zealand. All medical schools will have the opportunity to apply for the award. Ten prizes, each of \$500 and a certificate, will be awarded to the best undergraduate students in pain medicine in the last two years of undergraduate training.

Regional Committees

FPM NSW Regional Committee CME Evening: Renaissance in Opioid Therapy: Striving for Wisdom & Safety

On Thursday 16th September, FPM fellows and trainees from Sydney and the surrounding area gathered for the FPM NSW Regional Committee's Continuing Medical Education Dinner Meeting. The many disciplines fundamental to the practise of Pain Medicine were well represented, and there was an encouraging number of current and potential trainees in

attendance. Overall, the meeting was a great success, achieving the Committee's aims of providing an opportunity for education as well as fostering a sense of community and peer support amongst Pain Medicine practitioners in Sydney and the surrounding areas.



FPM Qld Regional Committee

Statewide Persistent Pain Steering Committee

This Committee will assist in administering the Statewide Persistent Pain Health Services Strategy 2010–2015 and the new funding announced in the

Queensland State Budget. There was considerable interest to the call for expressions of interest, with many people applying. Approximately 12 were appointed including four Faculty Fellows:

The FPM QRC plans to support this Steering Committee wherever possible to achieve a good outcome for Pain Medicine services across the State. This includes establishing other units for training and supporting a rotational training program.

Report on the International Pain Summit: Montreal Convention Centre, 3 September 2010

The first International Pain Summit was held at the Montreal Convention Centre on Friday 3rd September 2010. This meeting followed the very successful Australian Pain Summit in Canberra on the 11th March 2010.

The Montreal meeting was convened by Prof Michael Cousins AM who headed an international organising subcommittee. 250 delegates attended the meeting from most membership countries involved in the International Association for the Study of Pain.



Australia was well represented with Prof Michael Cousins as the Chairman and Convenor. Prof Margaret Sommerville gave a significant address by video on Human Rights and Ethics. Dr James Cleary from Wisconsin also spoke strongly on the need for pain management in palliative care. Impressive papers were presented by Dr Noor Abdullah, Deputy Director General of Health, Malaysia and Dr Jerman Ochoa from Columbia. Dr Rajagopal from India presented his impressive activities establishing over 20 pain clinics in Kerala, India.

The 250 delegates contributed to the development of an international strategy and plan to improve access to pain medicine services throughout the world. The organising committee will now finalise a paper titled The Declaration of Geneva which will be submitted to the Council of the International Association for Pain for final endorsement.

The meeting concluded with the statement that pain management is the fundamental right of all human beings.

COMMUNICATION

2010 - 2011 Global Year Against Acute Pain

The Global Year Against Acute Pain (GYAAP), launched on Monday 18 October, attracted significant publicity following the distribution throughout Australia and New Zealand of a media release prepared by ANZCA and the FPM, that highlighted the fact that managing pain is not routinely taught to medical students and young doctors.

The ANZCA Communications Unit also produced a poster, developed in collaboration with the APS, NZPS and ASA, which was widely distributed for use to promote GYAAP and increase awareness of acute pain.
